4. DG Azevedo welcomes Cote Divoire's Efforts in Trade Facilitation

WTO Director-General Roberto Azevêdo visited Abidjan, Côte d'Ivoire, today (16 February) as part of his current visit to West Africa. The Director-General met with President Alassane Ouattara, Prime Minister Daniel Kablan Duncan, Minister of Trade Jean-Louis Billon and other senior government representatives to welcome Côte d'Ivoire's leadership on trade facilitation and discuss how the WTO can complement initiatives to support the country's development.

5. Cambodia ratifies trade facilitation agreement

Cambodia has ratified the Trade Facilitation Agreement (TFA), becoming the 8th least-developed country to do so. Cambodia deposited its TFA instrument of acceptance with the WTO Secretariat on 12 February.

This makes Cambodia the 69th WTO member to ratify the TFA. The Agreement will enter into force once two-thirds of the WTO membership has formally accepted the Agreement. To read more please visit: <u>https://www.wto.org/english/news_e/news16_e/fac_12feb16_e.htm</u>

6. Thailand is third WTO member to accept the TRIPS Agreement in 2016

Thailand deposited its instrument of acceptance for the 2005 protocol amending the WTO's Agreement on Trade-Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights (TRIPS) on 28 January 2016, becoming the third WTO member to do so in 2016. Thailand accepted the amendment after several years of debate at the national level.

The protocol amending the TRIPS Agreement, which was adopted in 2005, is intended to make it easier for poorer WTO members to access affordable medicines. The protocol allows exporting countries to grant compulsory licenses to their generic suppliers to manufacture and export medicines to countries that cannot manufacture the needed medicines themselves. 7. Towards Africa's own mega-regional: The CFTA

The first negotiating session of the Continental Free Trade Area negotiations will take place later this month, the Commissioner for Trade and Industry of the African Union Commission has announced. This first set of negotiations will lay the groundwork for upcoming substantive negotiations throughout this year until 2017, the indicative deadline for the establishment of a Continental FTA across Africa.

The Tripartite FTA, a stepping stone bringing together Africa's three major regional economic communities in preparation for the CFTA, was signed into force in June of last year. 8. Importance of Standard: UNECE standards help Namibia export grapes to Europe

Last December, for the first time ever, containers with grapes left the port of Lüderitz, Namibia, bound for Europe - and they all complied with the quality requirements set out in UNECE's agricultural standards.

While such shipments are everyday business for neighbouring and highly successful fruit exporter South Africa, for arid Namibia with erratic rainfall and dry spells, exporting to Europe and being able to meet and inspect marketing and quality requirements was a huge step forward. 9. EU-Vietnam Free Trade Agreement Now Available Online

The European Commission today published the <u>text of the free trade agreement (FTA) between the EU</u> <u>and Vietnam</u>, following the conclusion of the negotiating process in December 2015.

10. US, Italy Leaders Push for TTIP Outcome Amid Questions over Timeline

The <u>twelfth TTIP round</u> is set to take place from 22-26 February in Brussels, Belgium, with subsequent meetings planned for April and July. During this upcoming round, US and EU are expected to discuss their initial public procurement offers - the third pillar of the market access talks, which also includes goods tariffs and services - along with discussing for the first time the EU's proposal for an investment court, among various other topics.

The EU had not formally tabled the proposal within the TTIP negotiating context. Now that it has, trade watchers will be looking to see how the US responds and whether the EU would be willing to revise aspects of the proposal, and if so in what way. They do not have an updated timeline to share at this stage however the TTIP is an Obama Administration priority. More will come after the Brussels meeting later this month. 11. ICAO Environment Committee Wraps Up Landmark 10th Meeting

The ICAO Committee on Aviation Environmental Protection (CAEP) concluded its landmark 10th Meeting at ICAO Headquarters in Montreal on Feb 12th, with progress recorded in a number of critical areas.

CAEP/10 was the first time that recommendations for two emissions standards were able to be finalised, paving the way for cleaner aircraft that have less impact on the global climate. An important Particulate Matter (ultrafine soot particles) Standard was one of these, while the second was the much awaited aircraft CO₂ emissions design Standard, the first global Standard for CO₂ emissions for any sector.

A methodology to quantify air cargo CO₂ emissions was also approved. This complements the ICAO carbon calculator for passenger air travel emissions and is our new contribution to the UNEMG. 12. FAA Urges Airlines to Assess Lithium Battery Risks

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) issued a safety alert to U.S. and foreign commercial passenger and cargo airlines, urging them to conduct a safety risk assessment to manage the risks associated with transporting lithium batteries as cargo.

FAA also is issuing guidance to its own inspectors to help them determine whether the airlines have adequately assessed the risk of handling and carrying lithium batteries as cargo. The FAA's <u>Safety Alert</u> For Operators (SAFO) (PDF) encourages airlines that previously conducted safety assessments to reevaluate them in light of new evidence from the agency's recent lithium battery fire tests. 13. UNECE: Statistics of Road Traffic Accidents in Europe and North America

Between 2003 and 2013, the total number of fatalities in road traffic accidents decreased by more than 30 per cent in the UNECE region, reaching 108,857 in 2013. This trend was particularly pronounced between 2007 and 2010 with average annual decreases of more than 8 per cent.

In 2013, Sweden, the United Kingdom and the Netherlands had the lowest number of fatalities per capita with Kyrgyzstan, the Russian Federation and Kazakhstan having the highest rates.
