8. IEA Finds CO2 Emissions Flat for 3rd Straight Year in Growing Global Economy

Global energy-related carbon dioxide emissions were flat for a third straight year in 2016 even as the global economy grew, according to the International Energy Agency, signalling a continuing decoupling of emissions and economic activity. This was the result of growing renewable power generation, switches from coal to natural gas, improvements in energy efficiency, as well as structural changes in the global economy.

9. FINLAND Shares Trove of Transport Data

On April 6th 2017 the Finnish Transport Agency opened up over 1.8 Terabytes of data (2.5 million separate .CSV files) collected in the automatic traffic counting system TMS. This is part of a wider effort by the Finnish Government to make publicly collected societal data available in the public domain. This includes, for example, large parts of meteorological, cartographic, sociological data etc. One of the aims of providing such data platforms is to boost private sector's innovations to various type of services and products. 10. UNECA Urges Africa to Invest More in Infrastructure for Sustainable Development

African governments and their partners should focus on developing hard infrastructure and support efforts of Ministers in charge of Trade and Integration to realise a Continental Free Trade Area (CFTA) that encompasses rules for intra-African trade in goods and services, key among them energy, transport and logistics services.

This was said at the African Union Specialised Technical Committee (STC) on Transport, Transcontinental and Interregional Infrastructures, Energy and Tourism (TIIIET) that opened in Togo last week

Africa wants to create one the most attractive economic zones through a homogenised Customs union and economic community, but regulation and weak integration hinder investment opportunities. UNECA suggested Africa should remove the bottlenecks impending more investment flows, where the African Investment Code (PAIC) may have a role. The Continental Free Trade Area (CFTA) is said to represent an opportunity for the continent to have "free movements of goods, services, people and capital."

Highway.
